## Welcome!

Why wait? That’s what previous clubhouse directors have told me. First and foremost a clubhouse is about community. The building, which we hope will come soon, is the place that the members, staff and friends will gather, share resources and call their own. *While* we are waiting we have decided to go ahead with many of the activities of a clubhouse without actually having a clubhouse. We call it our “Clubhouse Without Walls” program. Which is our way to build the clubhouse community while we gather resources and secure more funding for what will become our center. C.W.W. is a creative endeavor indeed!

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For those of you who are not familiar with us - a

*clubhouse is a center that gathers people with a diagnosis of serious mental illnesses and provides a community center with activities that help members receive support for employment, education, housing, socializing and provide mutual support with an intentionally small staff to help.*

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Well, we can’t be anything smaller as far as staff goes... for now it is just me! But I’m not alone! Besides a committed and supportive board of directors we have charter members who this past January and February were involved in advocating for more funding from the State. (See page 3— Community Education) Members were also actively planning trips to local clubhouses to experience

clubhouses firsthand. Through these trips members have brought back ideas which they are hoping to implement in “GOC”.

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A special appreciation goes out to our GOC Board Members, *Meridian Behavioral Healthcare* and the local *Department of Children and Families*. Also those who have made private donations to the clubhouse! Our most recent grants come from **Altrusa International of Gainesville** and **The Able Trust**. It is worth mentioning that *The Able Trust* is singularly funding the “Clubhouse Without Walls” program.

## Member View... "Is Music Dead?" by Mike Lemay

Is music really dead? I mean look at the times we are living in. What do we call our decade anyway? The zeros? Just about every decade prior to ours in the Nineteenth century has had great music. So what happened to this decade!?

"Hip Hop is dead", says Nas. "Rock 'n Roll is dead", said Lenny Kravitz; although he said that years ago. Music just doesn't sound the same anymore. "Does anyone make real sh\*t anymore?"- (Kanye West.)

Let me give you an example of great music in the Nineteenth century and the decades they were in. In the '40's it was the blues and jazz mostly, and some folk music. Leadbelly performed in that decade.

In the fifties it was Chuck Berry, Elvis, Buddy Holly, Jerry Lee Lewis, Bill Haley and the Comets, Ben E. King, The Temptations, Gene Vincent, Bo Diddley, The Platters. The fifties had a real feeling of freshness for music.

Then in came the revolutionary '60's. The Beatles with two prodigies John Lennon and Paul McCartney The Beatles not only changed music history, but the history of our entire culture. It was ok for men to start wearing long hair, drug use wasn't so taboo. The fifties was all about conformity and The Beatles made the sixties about love. Psychedelic Rock bands like Jefferson Airplane were "out there". Creedence Clearwater Revival, John Fogarty is and was, a free spirited man, with a passion for music. Cream's Eric Clapton is a great guitarist in many peoples eyes. Elton John was very flamboyant.. Joe Cocker has a unique voice. David Bowie is a living legend and was a very ambiguous artist.. The Rolling Stones keep on rolling. Free, Traffic, Led Zeppelin had a following. Jethro Tull was

a famous performer. The sixties had a free love feel to it. The decade of music that most prominently changed music forever.

The seventies were interesting but bland. Disco sucked majorly; YMCA, The Bee Gees ,Abba. The Sex Pistols livened things up a bit. Punk rock was like a gateway to other music. The seventies were a mixed bag. You had artists like Libberachi playing at the same time as the Sex Pistols? The Who, The Misfits, Aerosmith (who still performs today.) Queen, started in the seventies; with Brian May on Guitar and the great Freddy Mercury who relished the adoration of the crowd. The seventies had a rebellious feel.

The eighties were pretty boring and basically the same genre. Flock of Seagulls. Duran Duran, Men at Work, Toto, Madonna (who really shook up the world with her shocking antics) , Bruce Springsteen (The Boss), Poison (not bad) , The Cars, Def Leppard, Paula Abdul, Blondie, Depeche Mode, U2, Foreigner, Peter Gabriel, Bon Jovi, Billy Idol, INXS, Kenny Loggins, Men without Hats, George Michael (a bi-sexual talented man), Morrissey, New Kids on the Block, Gary Numan, Robert Palmer, Pixies, The Pretenders, Prince, REM, Talking Heads, Beastie Boys etc. The exception of the eighties (in my opinion) was Guns 'n Roses. Guns 'n Roses had a kick as\* guitarist in Slash, a great songwriter and singer in Axel Rose, and Duff and Iggy were good performers too. Guns 'n Roses stage presence was awesome. A good thing about the eighties was the invention of hip hop or rap. LL Cool J, Beastie Boys, Run DMC, Grand Master Flash, Public Enemy started it off.

The Ninety's were a trip for me growing up. The Red Hot Chili Peppers were great, with "Flea's" funky bass riffs. Nirvana defined the early nineties with grunge. Pearl Jam, Sound Garden, Alice in Chains, and

Mud Honey were other grunge bands. 2 Live Crew, Onyx, Sir Mix a Lot, and NWA were some early rap groups. NWA really defined the beginning of gangster rap, with legendary artists like Ice Cube, Dr.Dre, Easy-E, MC Ren, and Jerry Yella. Green Day had a different sound to them. Mid nineties bands were Linkin Park, Korn, Limp Biscuit, System of a Down, Primus, Smashing Pumpkins etc. Warren G was a mid nineties rap singer. TLC was a mid nineties rap group. Where rap hit the big time was with the Notorious BIG and Tupac Shakur. It was an East coast versus West Coast battle with other rappers including Nas, Puff Daddy, Snoop Dogg, Lil Kim etc. The Notorious BIG was (in my opinion) the greatest rapper ever. Tupac is still loved today. Some Pop Punk bands of the nineties include The Offspring and Blink 182. Late '90s rap groups include Master P, Eminem, 50 Cent. The nineties were somewhat like the sixties as far as a revolution.

So in conclusion; is music dead? Will there be a rap savior or a rock prodigy in the near future? I guess we will see. But don't ever give up hope in something greater than you have ever seen in music. Maybe the next American Idol will lead us to a whole new genre. American Rap Idol should be out there. So I guess all I can say is: "Keep your ears open."


