The series chronicled ways that people are handling emotional stress and mental health issues. The grant was designed to bring some local stories to the forefront. Pam Shamel, who is the Director of Education and Outreach at WUFT, wrote the grant and immediately thought of the Gainesville Opportunity Center.

Well the video is done and we couldn't have asked for a better film to highlight GOC, what we do, who our members are, and what are needs are. You can view it via the GOC website homepage or via You Tube.

Our hope for the video is to show it to potential employers, and potential members, and to anyone who wants to know about

GOC. The video is twelve minutes long and showed the clubhouse, Greg in his apartment, and Joel at work in the kitchen in a local High School.

place to go to that is comfortable.



A MEMBER'S STORY — GREG UMLAUF



Greg has been a GOC member since July 2008. He found out about the clubhouse at a NAMI Walk-a-Thon where he met the executive director, Mike Demers. He volunteers at the club, helping other

members with a variety of things, as well as writing articles for the GOC Gazette.

Greg's favorite part of the clubhouse is making a difference in people's lives whether as member or as staff. He currently works at Burger King as a crew member.

Greg was diagnosed with Bipolar Mood Disorder in 1975 at the age of 17. He claims his whole entire adult life has been affected by this illness where he has been through over twenty major hospitaliza-

tions and even more time in half-way-houses. His life has been fragmented by all these interruptions. Greg is very grateful just to be alive after being so depressed for so many years and he gives much credit to scientific researchers for improving meds which help him lead a stable life.

He has written three books on mental health issues including an autobiography where he also gives credit to all the taxpayers contributing the funds to help improve mental health awareness. Greg has also written over 300 songs since 1979 and has even recorded some in professional studios.

Some highlights of Greg's employment are working as an apprentice optician, warehouse manager, manager of a high end cabinet shop, as well as a Peer Recovery

Specialist at Meridian Behavioral Healthcare, Inc., for which he currently holds certification.

Greg says he is the most content and even happier in his life now than what he called a "fairy tale" childhood. He understands how fortunate he is to have a very supportive family and a great team of professionals that work with him week to week.

Greg would like to say to anyone who is down and ready to give up: "give God time to heal your wounds, life is a very precious thing".

By coming to the clubhouse, Greg says it takes focus off the attention on himself so he can help others. Greg's 52nd birthday is coming up in May.
