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Amazing Give 2019

On March 20-21, the Gainesville Opportunity Center (GOC) will be participating in the Amazing Give. The Amazing Give is a 24-hour fundraising event for nonprofits. The Amazing Give is held by the Community Foundation of North Central Florida. Last year, 88 organizations participated. This is our greatest annual fundraising effort.

Members and staff both work together to raise money through multiple methods, such as planning and peer to peer fundraising. Members can also share about the GOC through social media. On Facebook, members can share their testimony about how the GOC impacts their life and a link to the Amazing Give website.



We kicked off the Amazing Give with a 'flapjack fundraiser,' on March 2nd at Applebee's. We raised \$1,100 that will be used as matching money for the Amazing Give and spread awareness about our program. We are thankful for everyone who supported us.

GOC is collaborating with the Gainesville Peer Respite and NAMI to paint the SW 34th Street wall when the Amazing Give webpage goes live on March 11th. We will all meet at the wall to paint three blocks: one for NAMI, GOC and GPR. Even though we're three separate organizations, we all

work together to raise mental health awareness.

Last year, the GOC raised \$17,500 and we hope to beat that number this year. We need to raise \$25,000 for the GOC. This money will help to train more employees and help us better assist our members. We need to train our employees in ICCD training. ICCD training is a two-week program to teach the Clubhouse model to staff, members, and

board members. This is required for our organization to become accredited.

The Amazing Give kickoff will be on March 20th from 6-9pm. Members, staff and board members will begin by hosting a social. It will be held at the Northwest Grille 5115 NW 39th Ave. It is open to the public and

friends of GOC are encouraged to attend.

There is research evidence that fully accredited clubhouses have improved employment results with our high risk population. Clubhouses not only help people get jobs, but provide support so members can keep them.

Office Unit

In the office unit, we created quarter-page marketing flyers that staff and members can hand out at events. The quarter-page sheet provides information about what the GOC offers and how to get in contact with us.

We also created centerpieces for the flapjack fundraiser in the office unit. They will spotlight members on individual tables in order to personalize the flapjack fundraiser experience. This way, guests, members, and staff will be able to learn more about what GOC does for unique members and what these members plan to do with their GOC experience.

Members are starting to become familiar with Microsoft Publisher and are able to utilize it to make creative materials.

Media Team

We purchased a new iPad and Mactintosh desktop for the Media Team. Ouida will be able to teach graphic design using the iMac. The iMac will also make it possible to edit promotional videos. The computer will come with Final Cut Pro, which is the industry standard. Members will learn how to edit video on the same software that is used by T.V. stations and Hollywood studios. The skills learned in making these videos could be applied by members in a new job.

We can also take the paintings by GOC members and create thank you cards to send to donors of the GOC. This way, members are able to take a therapeutic skill and turn it into a potential source of revenue.

Culinary Unit

In the culinary unit, we planted new seeds to use for our daily lunch. Examples of these are broccoli, radishes, and beans. They are sprouting nicely! Some crops have become so large, we've already needed to transplant them.

Also, we are in the process of purchasing a commercial dishwasher. It will help us to be more professional, as well as help a lot of members out. Dishwashing by hand has been difficult at the GOC we because we use a large amount of dishes in a small space. The commercial dishwasher should help us speed up the dishwashing process so that dishes pile up less and so that less people have to be in the dishwashing area at once.

Wellness Team

The Wellness Team will be having a smoking cessation class on April 2nd. It will take place at the GOC starting on April 2nd and go until May 7th. The classes will be from 1:00-2:30pm on every Tuesday. It's a 5 week program at the GOC that will help Members develop coping mechanisms to replace smoking habits. It's run by the Suwannee River Area Health Education Center.

The goal is to help members who wish to curb the unhealthy habit gain encouragement and support in a safe environment. After the end of the class, the GOC and participating members will decide how to provide continued support. Come to the GOC on Tuesdays from 3-4 pm for our Wellness Team meeting to work on new goals. Or join us for our daily wellness walk at 3:30.
