Wellness

Due to a recent spike in Covid cases, we are re-instituting our masking policy. We ask all Members, staff, and visitors to wear masks while inside the building.

This enhances our health standards at the GOC, allows our Members to work in an environment similar to the food industry, and helps Members have the confidence needed to achieve employment.

GOC GAZETTE State Leaders Visit GOC

Eyes continue to focus on the Gainesville Opportunity Center. State Senator Jennifer Bradley and the CEO of the Florida Association of Managing Entities Natalie Kelly visited our program in August. Both are leaders who are tasked with finding innovative and cost effective solutions to help people who have difficulties at times helping themselves. Read on to find out more regarding how the GOC fits into important statewide initiatives.

Many of you are aware that the State of Florida Department of Children and Families supports people who have difficulties living independently and performing certain daily tasks. Some services are provided directly by DCF, and other services flow through non-profits or other government agencies. What many of you might not know is that DCF partners with seven private regional managing entities to disburse some of this funding. The GOC receives state funding from DCF through our managing entity, Lutheran Services of Florida. LSF has people spread throughout our region who are evaluating the needs of the people in every community. They fund areas ranging from medication and treatment to employment and housing.

Over the years, people have begun to realize that providing support services often costs less than crisis services. And if those supports keep people out of crisis (hospitals and jails,) it helps make people's lives better while saving taxpayers money.

As people have become more aware of the need of people living with mental illness, crisis spending has gone up,. That is something that has been greatly needed. What is also needed is more support through programs that help people feel productive, find stable housing, and gain employment. All of these help people stay out of crisis. To address this, DCF initiated a Recovery Oriented System of Care approach to the populations we serve. Mental Health Clubhouses, like the GOC are evidence based programs with a track record of helping people live more independent, productive and meaningful lives.

Senator Bradley is on a key committee that funds DCF.


Natalie Kelly helps the Managing Entities work together and speak with a unified voice.

DOC Community Summit

Members have the right to participate in all aspects of the Clubhouse, including advocacy. Lasheka and Akeem represented the GOC at the Florida Department of Corrections' F.A.C.E. I.T. public event. This new program is designed to help individuals succeed by emphasizing rehabilitation. The DOC has learned over the years that people who are released on parole or probation often violate because of ignorance of the rules or because of their struggles to meet basic needs. By providing an atmosphere where people can get support, they are more likely to make better choices.

Incarceration in the state system costs almost \$30,00 per year, and many of the people incarcerated have disabilities that make it difficult for them to care for themselves. But with the right support, we can make people's lives better and save taxpayers money.





The Department of Corrections is another important community partner. Together, we help people get new opportunities and reduce re-offenders.
